dear friends,

When we look back at this journey over the last five years, we can hardly believe how far this community at The Exodus Road has come and how much progress for freedom has been made.

From our first mission with police freeing eight young women in Thailand to today, where 800 men, women, and children have found freedom across five continents and 250 traffickers have landed in court, it's been an incredible journey so far.

2016 was a powerful year of progress. We trained and supported 57 operatives (both national staff and Western volunteers) and logged countless hours in dark corners of the world resulting in successful raids for 94 individuals. We employed social workers to give aftercare to survivors, invested in two storytelling trips with influencers to raise awareness, and grew as an organization financially by 39%.

Frederick Douglas once wrote: "I prayed for twenty years but received no answer until I prayed with my legs." Thank you for "praying with your legs" – for stepping from apathy to action with The Exodus Road. We can't thank you enough.

help me, I have been trafficked: inside a rescue

The Facebook message read: "Help me, I have been trafficked."

22 year old Noi*, from Thailand, had just gotten off the plane in The Kingdom of Bahrain a few hours before. She was promised a job working in a hotel, but as soon as she landed, three female traffickers immediately took her passport. They were holding her in a hotel room with 10 other young Thai women.

"Please hurry; I'm hiding in the bathroom, and they don't know I'm talking to you. They have my passport," Noi continued to text.

With the help of our Thai Operations Manager and while coordinating five different government agencies from both countries, police struggled to pinpoint her location. We texted Noi back, "We need you to be brave; we need you to take photos outside your window."

Noi took the photos, and finally, a location was determined. A mission was launched by the SWAT team in The Kingdom of Bahrain, and Noi was rescued within 48 hours of sending that first Facebook message.

Today, eight months later, we are happy to report that Noi is currently doing well. In February, she married a boy from her village, and she has started a new life — one where she's free.





Empower Rescue

We conduct investigations, partner with police, provide covert gear, encourage prevention and support aftercare projects.

Equip Nationals

We offer training, educate with programs like TraffickWatch®, provide cutting-edge technology, and donate resources to locals.

Encourage Collaboration

We engage in intentional networking, partner with local authorities and like-minded nonprofits, and encourage online advocacy.

what about prevention + aftercare?



prevention

We educate thousands through targeted campaigns, both online and at public and private events, and train national leaders.



aftercare

We provide support services to survivors with qualified partners. We also employ social workers to advocate for survivors during and following raids.

boys can be trafficked, too

In December, The Exodus Road and local police worked a successful sting operation in SE Asia that rescued six teenage boys from sex trafficking.

All of the boys were between the ages of 14 and 16. The team worked for over six months and logged countless hours to gather actionable intel to support law enforcement. Two prominent traffickers in the region were arrested. One of the operatives on mission later wrote:

"We had some issues during the operation and believed that it could have been compromised. We were considering aborting due to risk, but my partner turned to me and said: 'I'm not leaving my wife and kids after only 15 minutes. I couldn't live with myself if I did.' [And I agree.] It's not a job or a hobby to me; they are [like] my own wife and children. I won't give up on them."

This case represents the incredible collaboration between ALPHA Team (Thai nationals), DELTA Team (Western deployed operatives), and local authorities. It is a testament to the tenacity, investigative excellence, and compassion our teams bring to the front lines.

The boys are now in the care of the Social Welfare Department. We will continue to follow up with them throughout 2017.

Ana* is one of our national social workers. This woman has a huge smile, and she is quick to share it. Ana has been on staff with us for two years with BRAVO Team in India. Her job is to comfort and support survivors during and immediately following a raid with police – an event which is often traumatic.

"Whatever life I have left I am going to donate to this cause. As long as I am alive, I want to focus on one issue: human trafficking," Ana told us.

"To me it is not just *going* on mission

— I am always *on* mission."

Ana's work caring for the most vulnerable, when they are at their most vulnerable remains a critical part of rescue. We understand that a successful raid is just the *first step* to true freedom.



Expansion:

Our strategy has worked in SE Asia, it's worked in India, and now we are bringing it in force to North, Central and South America. Our expansion into the Americas will take place over the course of 2017 and will include the addition of field staff, national investigators, covert gear, and partnerships with local authorities and aftercare partners.

TraffickWatch®:

TraffickWatch will become an online interactive training platform. It will be an effective tool to educate a large volume of people on the realities of trafficking. It will include signs to be aware of, action steps to get involved, and engaging data on both global and local trafficking.

Cyber Ops:

In 2017 we will launch a cutting-edge Cyber Operations Center that will be used to gather, track and analyze data from the internet and from our field teams. Utilizing key software, programs and technology, we will fight trafficking smarter and more effectively.
