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Dear friends,

As I reflect on 2021, it's astounding to think of all of the ways this community propelled freedom forward — through obstacles and adversity.

The COVID-19 pandemic continued to disrupt global operations, as our international teams faced periodic lockdowns throughout the year. But those teams truly made the best of a hard situation, using the time they could not be on assignment to build crucial relationships and develop best practices for investigations. This has made them more effective than ever. The result was **138 survivors rescued and 125 traffickers arrested in 2021.**

Another cause for celebration: **we established a national team in the Philippines in 2021**, and they have built relationships that will be key in human trafficking investigations. We also **provided vital digital intelligence tools to law enforcement in Brazil** in partnership with Cellebrite. In a matter of months, those tools led to a successful raid that freed a teenage girl.

Our wins in 2021 weren't limited to Search + Rescue. During the fall, **we launched Traffick Watch Academy U.S.** This free, two-module online course is now equipping eager activists in the U.S. with knowledge about what trafficking looks like and how to get involved in fighting it. And in December, **we opened Freedom Home, our very first safe house providing aftercare to adult women survivors of trafficking in Thailand.**

In the middle of all these milestones, I experienced an expansion of my personal work as well. In 2021, **I accepted the role of CEO of The Exodus Road**, as my husband and Co-founder Matt Parker transitioned into the position of Chief Strategy Consultant for International Programs. This shift honors both of our skillsets and passions, recognizing the ways we've grown since beginning this work together in 2012.



OUR VISION

OUR MISSION

We disrupt the darkness of modern-day slavery by partnering with law enforcement to fight human trafficking crime, equipping communities to protect the vulnerable, and empowering survivors as they walk into freedom.



Rescues & Arrests

138 women and children freed from human trafficking.

125 traffickers arrested.

Since our beginning through 2021, 1,569 survivors have been freed from human trafficking and 877 traffickers have been arrested!



Freedom Home Opened!

We spent 2021 creating curriculum, hiring and training staff, and preparing the space for Freedom Home, our survivor care center and shelter in Thailand.

We opened its doors in late 2021, and our team of social workers supported 8 survivors with aftercare services before the close of the year.



TraffickWatch U.S. & Brazil

In the fall of 2021, we released TraffickWatch U.S., offering free training on human trafficking awareness and prevention to ordinary citizens.

We built partnerships with 5 states in Brazil to begin providing training on human trafficking prevention and intervention to 20,000 police officers.

6 COUNTRIES OF OPERATION

We opened our office in the Philippines in 2021, and now we are working in 6 countries around the world to advance freedom!



ROB HODES: RACING FOR FREEDOM

Racecar driver Rob Hodes is leveraging his platform to raise awareness for the fight to end human trafficking around the world.

Hodes first became aware of human trafficking more than a decade ago while in Thailand, where he saw children and young women on the streets being offered to tourists for sex. In 2020, he learned about The Exodus Road's work of finding, freeing, and caring for victims of sex trafficking, and he has been championing the cause ever since.

In 2021, Hodes funded the start-up of Freedom Home in Thailand, The Exodus Road's first safe house and aftercare center (see page 8). Hodes also donates his car's advertising space to The Exodus Road. In 2021, he raced in some of the most high-profile races in the world — the European Le Mans Series, Le Mans Cup, 24 Hours of Daytona, and ISMA SportsCar Championship, bringing awareness to the issue of human trafficking and the work of The Exodus Road while he races.

In 2022, he'll be racing with Team Virage, and the car will feature a QR code that leads to a web page with educational resources on the topic of human trafficking. Hodes hopes that racing fans will visit the page, learn about the issue, and be

inspired to take action to help make a free world.

The Exodus Road (TER) interviewed Rob Hodes (RH) to learn why he uses his platform to raise awareness for this issue.

TER: Why do you care so deeply about human trafficking?

RH: Thinking about any human being, let alone a woman or child, being enslaved and violated, crushes my soul. Just because we may not all be witnesses to such a scenario, we are all affected by it. No human being should be bought and sold like a commodity. If we choose to ignore the suffering of over 40 million victims, the majority of which are women and children, we diminish humanity.

TER: What are you hoping this type of advocacy will do for freedom?

RH: Awareness on all levels can only accelerate intolerance for human trafficking and lead to the freedom of victims. Human trafficking happens in every country, including our own. I've felt an urgency to do something to stop human



trafficking for a long time and am excited to work with The Exodus Road because they are expertly effective in search, rescue, aftercare, and prevention. I hope that awareness will prompt us all to join the "Race to End Human Trafficking."

TER: Why should the racing industry care about human trafficking?

RH: Racing is the ultimate freedom. It is a high-profile, high-octane, fast-paced lifestyle fueled by creativity and resourcefulness that reaches communities around the world as we travel from track to track. It only makes sense that the racing community takes a stand. Collectively, we have immense influence, resources, and networks to fuel the end of this atrocity.

I hope whenever someone sees the message on the Team Virage car, the speed of the car will symbolize an urgency to quickly free the most vulnerable of people trapped in the dark prison of human trafficking.

TER: Why have you partnered with The Exodus Road?

RH: Since a trip to Asia many years ago, I have been pained by this epidemic. I felt hopeless since it did not seem that law enforcement had any commitment to address the issue. When I connected with The Exodus Road, I was blown away by their partnerships with law enforcement at the highest levels. I felt hopeful and knew I could fuel efforts and strategies to make a real difference.

I have been on scouting missions and witnessed a raid in Thailand that freed underage children and resulted in the arrest of a perpetrator. I have also interacted with The Exodus Road staff and survivors in an aftercare center, so I can attest firsthand to the wonderful, caring, and effective team undertaking these initiatives. It's an honor to support this cause and share the privilege and opportunity with the racing community.

RACING FOR FREEDOM

OUR BIGGEST OPERATION OF 2021: OP. ESCONDIDA

Daniela* was just 14 when she was lured from her home.

A crumbling economy and gang violence made wariness a way of life in Venezuela. Daniela watched her family and neighbors do whatever they could to survive. Despite the difficulties, she held her hopes and dreams for the future close to her heart.

She was 14 when she got a text from a friend she had not heard from in months. “Hey, want a job?” the text asked. “I know you always wanted to try modeling!!”

As Daniela asked for details, her excitement grew. Her friend said it would be easy. The modeling job was in a neighboring country, but a talent agent would send someone to take care of the travel arrangements.

This is it, Daniela thought. This is my chance to survive.

The trip to her new workplace passed in a blur. Eventually, the car stopped beside a suburban home hemmed in by a tall fence. *This doesn't look like a modeling agency,* she thought.

Inside, Daniela found herself in a dim hallway. A brisk woman came and guided her into a side room with no windows. The only furnishing was a starkly-made bed. When the woman gave plain, matter-of-fact directions about what Daniela would be doing, the needles of anxiety grew into a piercing sword of terror.

The first man arrived. He was much older than Daniela. She was still hoping it couldn't be true as he closed the door behind him.

For two years, between the ages of 14 and 16, Daniela endured the repeated trauma of being sold for sex to strangers.

She didn't know that anyone was looking for her. But The Exodus Road's team in Latin America was actively following up on leads of sex trafficking. That's when this home-based brothel came to their attention. After months of high-risk investigation of the network of traffickers behind Daniela's captivity, our team delivered actionable evidence to law enforcement.

With the information the team collected, along with evidence from another nonprofit, multiple police departments mobilized in Operation Escondida. Splitting into two teams, police and investigators flooded the ring's brothels, including the suburban house where Daniela had spent two years being sold for sex.

20 women and children — including Daniela — were freed. 15 traffickers were arrested in The Exodus Road's biggest operation of 2021.

In addition to Daniela, they found one other teenage girl and 16 young women between the ages of 18 and 23. They also rescued two girls under the age of 8 from the brothels, children of the trafficked women.

All but two of the young women were trafficked from Venezuela, stranded in a country far from home. The women bravely gave statements to the police, and social workers arranged for the survivors to be transferred to the safety of aftercare services.

Meanwhile, 15 traffickers were arrested: 12 women and 3 men. They denied the charges, but The Exodus Road's Latin America team had done their job well. The evidence against the traffickers was irrefutable.

Operation Escondida was a triumph for freedom. Thanks to the dedication of The Exodus Road's community — from the investigators to the donors who fund their work — justice and freedom are coming to places of exploitation.

BEYOND RESCUE HIGHLIGHT

FREEDOM HOME'S DOORS OPEN TO SURVIVORS OF EXPLOITATION IN THAILAND

In late 2021, a long-held dream was realized when The Exodus Road's aftercare home in Thailand opened its doors to a survivor of human trafficking for the first time.

That moment was the culmination of careful planning, cultivating relationships, and finding the perfect staff members to offer compassionate, trauma-informed care to the adult female survivors who will be spending time in Freedom Home.





Located near an area where the sex industry is rampant, Freedom Home offers immediate shelter and care for women in crisis along with a long-term mentorship program aimed at helping survivors of exploitation build stable, healthy lives.

Trauma-informed aftercare is essential for lasting freedom. The Exodus Road's Thailand team has learned that often, survivors of trafficking return to the sex industry because they feel there are no other options. This outcome is especially likely for women between the ages of 18 to 25 during the first two years after they have been removed from exploitation. The Freedom Home focuses on meeting survivors' unique needs during this vulnerable time in their lives.

The Freedom Home's short-term program includes:

- Temporary housing, meals, and living essentials
- Comprehensive health evaluation
- Trauma therapy
- Business and financial management training
- Life-skills classes
- Limited legal support
- Repatriation/reintegration support
- Case management
- English classes
- Follow-up care

The long-term program includes:

- In-depth life-skills training
- Business and career education
- Integrated internship program
- Savings match

Freedom Home's services were designed to meet survivors where they are, addressing their individual stories and needs. When the house welcomed its first resident in late 2021, she came with her young daughter — something many aftercare shelters can't accommodate. This flexibility and focus on caring holistically for each life means Freedom Home can support survivors in ways they might not have access to anywhere else. In the long term, that stability promises to reduce the chance of re-exploitation.

Freedom Home was pioneered by Sola Long. Originally from Cambodia, Long has over 15 years of experience in social work, psychology, and aftercare for survivors.

“We know that aftercare requires a holistic treatment approach, particularly emphasizing trauma-informed care and comprehensive case management,” Long said. “Caring for trafficking survivors requires a trauma-responsive approach that recognizes the impact of trauma across the life span in order to avoid re-victimization and leverage survivors’ resilience to empower them.”

Every aspect of Freedom Home aims to support these strong, independent survivors as they recover their lives. We are so thankful for the staff of Freedom Home, who have poured so much passion and expertise into developing this safe haven, and for our supporters, who are empowering survivors as they walk towards freedom!

Maria was lured away from her home in Kenya into exploitive labor in Saudi Arabia. The Exodus Road board member Sarah Ray learned of her situation during a chance encounter in an airport.

Having fulfilled her contract, Maria is back in Kenya now. Thanks to support from The Exodus Road's Beyond Rescue program, she has been able to step into a role as a teacher at Grain of Rice Project, a nonprofit boarding school for vulnerable children in rural Kenya. Beyond Rescue is providing her salary for her first year, providing her with stability and community as she builds a new life after exploitation.

“I'm so happy for the position I am in, and I'm waiting for my better future,” Maria said. “I hope to become a great businesswoman. I also hope to change my country a little bit, if I can.”

CELLEBRITE TEAMS UP WITH THE EXODUS ROAD TO FIGHT HUMAN TRAFFICKING IN BRAZIL

A new era in the fight against human trafficking in Brazil began in 2021.

Although Brazil is the wealthiest and most developed nation in Latin America, the country has by far the most human trafficking victims in the Western hemisphere. There are an estimated 400,000 people trapped in modern-day slavery, the Global Slavery Index states. And, as most experts note regarding data on human trafficking, that number is likely far lower than the actual number of people impacted.

Yet much of law enforcement in Brazil has been poorly equipped to fight this pervasive crime.

Cellebrite, a global leader in Digital Intelligence solutions, has been an invaluable partner in The Exodus Road's fight against human trafficking around the world for 3 years, generously donating technology and training. This has allowed us to provide law enforcement agencies with state-of-the-art tools which they might otherwise not be able to access.

This year, a generous multi-year grant has enabled The Exodus Road to develop a groundbreaking training program for law enforcement in Brazil.

The training program, called TraffickWatch Academy Brazil, is an online training program on best practices in identifying and addressing human trafficking in Brazil. The eight courses, produced and tailored specifically for law enforcement in Brazil, are all accessible in Portuguese through a university-grade Learning Management System (LMS). Experts featured include Juliana Felicidade Armele, Assistant Secretary for Human Rights and Citizenship, City Hall of São Paulo; Gabriela Madrid Aquina, Chief of the Federal Police; Dr. Tatiana Leal Bivar Simonetti, State Attorney, Public Ministry of Labor; and Justin Cole, Cellebrite's Senior Developer and Trainer.

Brazilian authorities have already committed to train 20,000 law enforcement officers in five states through TraffickWatch Brazil.

"The TraffickWatch Academy project is fundamental because it promotes important expert dialogue between key actors in the repression of human trafficking and assistance to victims," said Graziella Rocha, Project

Coordinator for the Brazilian Ministry of Women, Family, and Human Rights, and one of the trainers.

Training topics include anti-trafficking laws and the judicial system in Brazil, building and closing human trafficking cases, gathering digital intelligence for cases, survivor care in Brazil, fighting the different forms of modern-day slavery, and global human trafficking crime.

"Utilizing the TraffickWatch Academy training for our officers will improve our ability to identify and prosecute cases of human trafficking," said Fabiano Barrosa, Training Manager for the Civil Police of Amazonas, Brazil. "We are grateful to have partnered with The Exodus Road to help bolster our ability to fight this horrible crime and bring freedom to people who are suffering in our community."

So much of this is possible thanks to the partnerships The Exodus Road's Brazilian Liaison, Cintia Meirelles de Azevedo, has forged. The relationships she has built will allow tens of thousands of law enforcement officers to be trained.

"There's a lack of awareness of the crime of human trafficking in Brazilian society," said de Azevedo. "The crime isn't seen as a crime, but merely as labor. Introducing education to police officers ... is like having glasses with the wrong lenses removed. When you finally put on the right lenses, you can see clearly. This training is the new lens for that officer on the front lines combatting crime."

Cellebrite also partnered with The Exodus Road in 2021 to provide digital intelligence technology to four distinct police departments across Brazil. This technology dramatically decreases the number of hours needed to investigate cases of human trafficking.

"Cellebrite's solutions have long been mission-critical in digital investigations for the global law enforcement community," said Laura Parker, CEO of The Exodus Road. "Our police partners around the world have leveraged Cellebrite's tools to track and arrest human traffickers and free their victims. It would be hard to overstate the impact their technology and generosity are having in the fight against trafficking."

Already, this technology and training are making a difference in Brazil. In October 2021, Brazilian law enforcement in a remote district, using both their training from TraffickWatch and Cellebrite's technology, was able to liberate a 15-year-old pregnant girl who was in forced sex work. This was the first human trafficking crime officially investigated and closed by this department. They attribute this success directly to their partnership with The Exodus Road.

"We are excited to continue building this relationship as a partner contributing to The Exodus Road's formal agreements to provide police with training to combat human trafficking," said Mark Gambill, Cellebrite's Chief Marketing Officer.




Katelyn Garcia






